Top 5 fish for the grill By Colin Field (taken from cottage life dockside)



While grilled fish are easy to enjoy, grilling fish is not so easy. Lighter fish tend to fall apart on the grill, dropping through the gaps and creating a real mess of your barbecue. But it doesn't have to be that way. Barbecuing fish may be a little tricky, but it's by no means impossible. All it takes is some patience, some practice, and the right piece of fish. There are plenty of options out there, and even some environmentally friendly ones to choose from, but we narrowed it down to five fish you should definitely throw on the barbie this summer.

Salmon

Glorious, delicious salmon is tough to beat. Its pink flesh holds together well, offering an easy-to-move piece of meat that never crumbles. Using fillets or sides, this is an easy one to cook skin side down as it doesn't even require flipping. You won't get the pretty grill marks without flipping it, but you'll maintain the integrity of the fish.

Halibut

Like salmon, halibut is a thick, meaty fish that won't fall to pieces after a bit of man-handling. This relatively inexpensive whitefish is mild-flavoured, available year round and can even be used as a chicken substitute in many recipes. Again, with a fillet or side, it's best to cook it skin side down without flipping it.

Pickerel

It's best to cook this fish whole. Clean it and stuff it with lemon or herbs, lay it on one side on medium-high and flip it only once so the skin doesn't rip.

Trout

Like pickerel, this is another local fish that is readily available in Ontario lakes. If you can catch one yourself, then you're all set. Otherwise, buy a whole trout. Like pickerel, it's best stuffed with lemon and herbs and cooked whole on the grill with only one flip.

Shrimp

Okay, so it's not fish, but these delicious little crustaceans are a tasty barbecue treat. But don't buy a cocktail ring at your local super store and think you're set: You'll need large shrimp that can be easily skewered so they're manageable on the grill.

Ziploc Omelette - submitted by Pat Costigan

(This works great! Good for when all your family is together. The best part is that no one has to wait for their special omelette!)

- 1. Write your name on a quart-size Ziploc freezer bag with a permanent marker.
- 2. Crack 2 large eggs into the bag (or into a bowl first & use a fork to mix).
- 3. Seal bag and shake to mix.
- 4. Open bag and add your choice of ingredients to the bag. Suggestions include:

cheeses green pepper ham diced tomatoes green onion mushrooms

- 5. Seal bag again making sure to get all the air out of the bag.
- 6. Make sure it is securely zipped up
- 7. Place the bags into rolling, boiling water for exactly <u>13 minutes.</u> (You can usually cook 6-8 omelettes in a large pot. For more, make another pot of boiling water.)
- 8. Open the bag and the omelette will roll out easily onto your plate. Be prepared for everyone to be amazed.

Nice to serve with fresh fruit and coffee cake; everyone gets involved in the process and it is a great conversation piece.

Note: Some people have added a little bit of salsa - but not too much.

LAKE MANITOU AREA ASSOCIATION Nineteenth Annual General Meeting July 14, 2012 10:00 a.m. Sandfield Schoolhouse

<u>Call to Order:</u> President, Mike Costigan, called the meeting to order.

<u>Consideration of the Agenda:</u> It was <u>Moved by Dave Rutherford</u>, <u>John De Chastelain</u> to accept the agenda as presented. Motion carried.

First time new member attendees were welcomed and local community events announced. International Joint Commission on Georgian Bay and Lake Huron Water Levels meeting at the NEMI Recreation Centre July 15, 2012. Mike made special mention that today was Alex and Mary Lochead's 60th anniversary.

Directors and Committee Chairpersons attending were introduced: Mike Costigan, John Harvey, Steve Mann, Paul Moffatt, Alex Lochead, Don Payne, Effie Williamson, Pat Costigan and Mary Lochead.

Minutes of July, 2011 Annual Meeting moved by Steve Mann and seconded by John Harvey to be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

Reports of the Officers:

Vice-President's Report: Paul Moffatt

Paul continues to represent our Association at Manitoulin Streams who seek to improve fishing and water quality and do stream restoration. They have two large projects on the Mindemoya River and one on Green Bay stream that runs into Green Bay. They are doing the engineering work and will be done this fall. Funding has been cut in half but donations from Walmart and Trillium Foundation have helped. Donations are being sought from other sources please spread the word! This is Manitoulin Streams 11th year and they have done almost 40 projects and spent two million dollars.

Treasurer's report: Don Payne

Don reported that we had a small net operating loss this past year but our finances are in good shape and submitted his report. The LMAA books were audited by Marlene Dewar and Betty Heis. Moved by Carl Mihalyfi and seconded by Tom Martel to accept the financial statement. Motion carrried.

Director's Report: Alex Lochead

Alex reported that water sampling for Lake Manitou is done by him and his son-in-law, Brad Sparks. It takes two people to do the sampling and it is currently done in Moody's Bay and Sandfield Bay. Samples are taken monthly from May to October and the secci disk count stays about 5 - 6. Bottled samples for phosphorus are sent to MNR in Dorsett and arrive there the next day. The clarity is consistent and Alex suggested that we post the readings in the local newspaper. Alex is coasting toward retirement and is looking for volunteers to help him. Any LMAA apparel ordered today will be delivered to the Information Nite Meeting in August.

Mike Costigan advised that Michael R. Costigan wants to thank everyone for their participation in the newsletter but urges that we all make contributions.

Education Committee

<u>John Harvey - Map Coordinator</u> advised that they are considering another printing and he needs to know of any corrections on the map before the end of July.

Pat Costigan had information on LMAA flags that are for sale. Four sizes of flags could be available and the prices are dependent on the number of flags ordered for each size. Flags can be ordered this fall after quantities and prices have been determined. Historical Tidbits of Lake Manitou Book, with some additional information and corrections, has been reordered as the current issue has sold out. The 2011 Information Night was very well attended and this year's Information Night will be on August 14 at 7:30 at the Sandfield School House and the speakers will be Dan Burns, testing your drinking water and Waste Management Choices, Dave Anderson, retired from MNR and is one of our members, his topic has not been confirmed. Paul Methner will bring us news of our lake.

<u>Mary Lochead</u> Sadly, Mary informed us after 17 years that she is stepping down and is hoping someone else takes up her cause to inform us all on how to enrich our lake by using phosphate free products. ..her report is covered by another article in our LMAA newsletter.

President, Mike Costigan's Report Mike said he continues to try and keep this general meeting to less than one hour and fifteen minutes. This is our Nineteenth General Meeting. We have been able to keep the fees at \$20.00 for yet another year as a result of good management by the executive. He thanked the members for encouraging others to join LMAA and keeping our membership strong and members involved. Some of the Executive attend FOCA meetings twice a year and inform our members what is going on in cottage country. We take water sampling, do buoy replacement, newsletters and communicate with the members as well as attending numerous meetings on Manitoulin pertaining to environmental concerns. LMAA has objected to the Davis McLay subdivision to be built near Red Lodge, as have the MOE and MNR. We are concerned about phosphorus load and the effect on oxygen levels in Green Bay which will affect the fish habitat. We are now on the agenda of the OMB hearings which should be held early in 2013 in Sudbury.

New Business and Discussion Period

In an effort to raise money for LMAA Jerry Zale would do a painting and sell prints of it. If you have any good pictures let him know.

Question about chemicals being used on lawns at the cottage and if there are rules in place to stop that. There is a general ban but herbicides can be used on farms and golf courses. We each could all do some research as there are alternative environmentally safe herbicides.
