Something New over Manitou by John Harvey

So I was eating lunch at my Lake Manitou cottage on May 18, 2012. I happened to glance up at the sky. A number of white birds were circling over head. My first thought was gulls and I was about to return to my sandwich when I realized these were not gulls, they were much larger, had bead bands along the rear of the wing and large yellow bills. They didn't fly like gulls, they all soared as they circled, and then flapped their wings together a few times before continuing to soar...a most majestic flight. There were 18 of them. We watched as the flock moved north and west, flying quite high until they passed from view over the narrows.

The next day in the Sandfield store, Bob Watson told me that a chap fishing on the lake the day before had seen a flock of strange white birds. He thought they might be snow geese but they didn't look like geese. From his designation, after looking in his bird book, Bob said that the closest he could find was the Albatross. Well of course, they were not Albatross, they were White Pelicans. These birds spend the winter fishing along the coast of Florida and the Gulf of Mexico. They migrate each spring to their nesting grounds on lakes in the northern Prairie Provinces, although there is a colony on Lake of the Woods, and a newly reported one on Lake Nipigon. Occasionally one is seen along the north shore of Manitoulin.

On a historical note, a flock spent the summer on Lake Mindemoya in the late 1940's and 4 were seen fishing at Gore Bay on May 28, 1979, but never before has a flock of 18 been seen here.

White Pelicans are really large birds with a wing span of 108 inches (nearly 3 metres) and weighing over 16 pounds. By comparison our beloved cormorants, to which they are related, have a wing span of only 52 inches and weigh in at about 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds.

Information Night 2012

Another successful environmentally themed "Information Night" was held at the Sandfield School house on Tuesday August 14th. This year's topics included **"Waste Management Choices and Safe Drinking Water"**, **"Solar Energy – an Alternative"**, and the annual **"Update on Lake Manitou"**.



For the third consecutive year it was standing room only for the three guest speakers. Thanks to the hard work of LMAA's Education Committee (Mary Lochead, Pat Costigan & John Harvey) the word is obviously spreading amongst lake residents as to the pertinence and quality of the presentations offered at the annual gathering. **Dan Burns (left)** from the Sudbury and District Health Unit discussed issues, regulations, and alternatives with regard to septic and potable water systems that are available to lake residents.

LMAA member and environmental enthusiast Dave Anderson delivered an interesting slide show on solar energy systems. Using pictures from his own projects around the island, the keenly interested audience was educated on roof top and stand alone systems that could be used to supplement rural residents on the grid or for the ambitious, ones that could take them completely off grid.

The evening ended with always anticipated update on the status of fish stocks in Lake Manitou by Paul Methner, Operations Manager of the Blue Jay Creek Fish Hatchery for the Ministry of Natural Resources.

Manitoulin Streams Projects on Lake Manitou - Summer 2012

Lower Norton's Creek

During the summer, work continued on Lower Norton's Creek to establish fascines (banks) to constrict the creek in order to increase the velocity of water downstream to scour sediment and create potential spawning habitat for brook trout. Volunteers with help from the Ontario Rangers put in a total of 182 hours to complete the work.





In the end, 92 sq. metres of shoreline were protected, stabilized or improved; two artificial fascine type banks were created and 3 others were enhanced with additional top soil and native seed; 6 beaver dams were removed; 2 beaver channels were blocked off to increase



stream velocity; 6 metres of wire mesh was installed under a bridge to prevent beavers from blocking water flow. In addition, College Boreal came with 11 students and 1 professor and spent 96 hours conducting electro-fishing surveys at four (4) sites and two (2)and invertebrate surveys along Norton's Creek in order to determine the status of the brook trout population in the creek. All information has been given to the MNR to enter into the NRVIS data layer.



Green Bay Creek- Lime Kiln Road, Green Bay



Green Bay Creek is fed by a cold water spring in the Green Bay bluff and then meanders its way down into Lake Manitou. The goal of this project is to increase the quality of the water that flows into Lake Manitou and rehabilitate the eroded creek banks.

Manitoulin Streams worked with the landowner on a remote watering project by installing two frost free nose pumps. The pumps were installed away from the creek to prevent water source contamination. The design of the pump prevents it from freezing during the winter and it includes a cement pad which prevents ground water contamination.

Volunteers from the LMAA assisted others from the Little Current Fish and Game Club and Manitoulin Streams to install cedar rail fencing which will restrict livestock access to the creek. In addition 358 trees were planted during the restoration of an eroded stream bank, enhancing the **riparian zone**.

As Mylaketown's first Canadian client, they agreed to reconfigure the system to support Canadian addresses. A significant new feature is that LMAA members with administrative access can easily update the website. In addition, LMAA members who join the site will be able to communicate with other members, upload photos, contact Board members, post personal classified ads, upload announcements, and learn more about other LMAA members and their activities. More website features are available for our future use.

We continue adding content and encourage you to visit frequently to review the progress. For example, this and past newsletters can be viewed or downloaded from the site's "Newsletters" page.

To gain access to the new features and help us build the LMAA website membership database, please log into the website and create your "Personal Profile." Please <u>click here</u> to view the special tutorial video that Mylaketown created especially for LMAA members. You will be shown the steps on how to join the website. After joining the site, as a current LMAA member, you will have full use of all the site pages and features. Your Personal Profile cannot be viewed by the general public, but logged-in LMAA members can, unless you choose to hide all or part of your profile data from other members.

To learn more, click on the green "Get Started" button on the website <u>home page</u>. That will take you to a set of short video tutorials on how to use various website features. For now, we recommend you only create your personal profile and delay creating your "Family Group" page.

If you can't play or you choose not to watch the videos, just follow the steps below to join the website. You will need to join and login to the website to use features not available to the general public.

- 1. From the home page (<u>lakemanitouarea.ca</u>), click the green "Join Us!" button.
- 2. Fill out and submit the form. Mylaketown recommends using your first and last name (with no space between) as your "user name."
- 3. Create a password of your choice (a combination of letters and numbers is recommended).
- 4. Except for phone numbers, all fields require entries.
- 5. Use your permanent home address, not your lake address. You will add your lake address to your "Personal Profile" after you have submitted the "Join Us" form.
- 6. Click the check box at the bottom of the form to accept the Mylaketown.com terms of agreement.
- 7. Enter the "Captcha" code displayed (If you have trouble reading the code, you can click the speaker icon hear the code).
- 8. Click the blue "Submit" button.
- 9. After five (5) seconds, you will be redirected to your Personal Profile page.
- Enter your personal data, where desired, by clicking "edit" in the various entry boxes. Edit the address box to enter your lake address. (Click "save" in each box to save your entries).
 Note: before saving, you can make some of these entries private.
- 11. If you click "Change to Private" in the blue bar at the top of your profile, you can completely hide your profile from other LMAA members.
- 12. You may now visit other areas of the site or log out.
- 13. When you join, you will receive a "Welcome New Website Member" message in your email inbox.
- 14. Finally, and this is important, please forward the welcome message in your inbox to me at <u>sasalisbury@cox.net</u> so I can activate your account.

Pumpkin Muffins Yield:-24

Ingredients:

4 eggs 2 cups white sugar 1 ¹/₂ cups oil 1 ³/₄ cups pumpkin (small can) 3 cups all-purpose flour 1 tbsp cinnamon
 2 tsp baking powder
 2 tsp baking soda
 1 tsp salt
 2 cups raisins

Instructions:

Beat eggs slightly; add sugar, oil, pumpkin and beat thoroughly.

Add dry ingredients and mix until smooth.

Stir in raisins.

Fill greased muffin cups 2/3 full and sprinkle tops with brown sugar.

Bake 375 °F for 15-20 minutes.

Paprika Cookies

1/2 Cup butter
1/2 Cup all purpose flour
3/4 Cup grated Cheese (I use cheddar)
1 Cup flour
1 tsp. Hungarian paprika
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1/2 Tbsp. poppy seeds
Note: For a larger number of people, double the amounts.

Pre heat oven to 375. Mix butter and cheese together until soft.

Sift flour, paprika, salt and mustard together, add to butter and cheese. Beat until blended. Flour hands, roll teaspoon of mixture into balls. Place on greased baking pan, flatten a bit, sprinkle with poppy seeds. Bake 15 min. or until golden, then leave to cool.

Oatmeal Cookies

1 Cup butter	1 1/2 Cups flour	
1/2 Cup brown sugar	2 Cups Rolled Oats	
1/2 Cup white sugar	1 Tbsp soda mixed with 4 Tbsp hot water	
1 egg	1 Cup walnuts, or chocolate chips, or some of both	
1 tsp. vanilla		
Cream butter and sugar, blend in eg	gg and vanilla. Add dry ingredients.	

Drop by teaspoon, flatten a bit, bake on cookie sheet @ 325 x8 min.
